LOUISVILLE: Mallory Comerford, Junior, Swimming

Mallory Comerford majors in marketing and boasts a 3.781 career GPA. She achieved a perfect 4.0 in the Fall 2017 semester, is a Dean's Scholar, a Chi Alpha Sigma Member, a Red & Black Scholar Athlete, and a member of the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. The reigning NCAA Champion and second-fastest American woman ever in the 200 free, Comerford was also voted ACC Women's Swimmer of the Year, and the Most Valuable Swimmer of the 2018 ACC Women's Swimming and Diving Championships. The junior from Kalamazoo, Michigan, took second place in the 100 free at the NAAs, and earned six total All-American nods. At the 2018 ACC Championships, Comerford earned five individual league titles, setting an ACC Championship record in the 100 free with a time of 46.65. Comerford won a Golden Goggles Award, the highest honors bestowed by USA Swimming when she was named Breakout Swimmer of the Year.

 - Started all 38 games. Her 20.8 ppg scoring average led the league, ranked 18th in the nation and set a new ND single season record. Her 791 total points also set a new ND record while her 291 made field goals ranked second.
 - Ice Twice -- Off an in-bounds play near team bench, Ogunbowale hit yet another Final Four buzzer beater, this time for the national championship vs Miss State. Ogunbowale finished with 18 points and was named Final Four Most Outstanding Player.
 - With one second left in overtime vs UConn in the National Semifinal, Ogunbowale delivered the dagger that gave the Irish a 91-89 win. Ogunbowale finished with 27 points with nine in the fourth and six in the overtime period.
 - Ogunbowale's 145 points in the NCAA Tournament were the fifth most all-time and the most by an Irish player, topping Ruth Riley's 139 in 2001. Ogunbowale averaged 24.2 ppg during the tourney and 22.5 at the Final Four.
 - Ogunbowale led the ACC with 25 games of 20+ points and shattered the previous single season record at ND, surpassing Jewell Loyd's and Katryna Gaither's 20.
 - Recorded five straight games with 20-plus points from FSU on March 3 to Texas A&M on March 24, coming one point shy of making it six straight with 19 points vs Oregon. Marked the best stretch of her career.
 - Played 16 ranked teams this season and in those games Ogunbowale averaged 20.3 ppg.
 - Ogunbowale averaged a team best 6.3 points in the fourth quarter on 53.5 percent shooting, including a .436 clip from three. She reached double-digit points in the fourth quarter alone seven times, including twice in the ACC Tournament. Ogunbowale tallied 15 points combined in the fourth quarter & overtime period vs UConn.
 - Game high 27 points in come-from-behind win over No. 6 Tennessee. Hit the game-tying free throws at the 5:48 mark.

- Named both ACC Player of the Week and the USBWA Ann Meyers Drysdale National Player of the Week after averaging 25.0 points in the win over Clemson and the historic comeback rally over No. 6 Tennessee.

VIRGINIA: Tara Vittese, Senior, Field Hockey

- Picked up her third-straight National Player of the Year honor in 2017
- Became the first field hockey player in the history of the sport to be named the National Player of the Year three times in her career
- Only the second Virginia athlete to be a three-time national player of the year in any sport, joining Ralph Sampson with that distinction
- The first Cavalier to be a two-time ACC Player of the Year (earning her second honor this season) and the first to be a four-time first team All-American.
- First UVA player to be named Longstreth/NFHCA South Region Player of the year three times
- First UVA player to ever win the honor of VaSID State Player of the Year four times
- Named first team All-ACC selection for fourth consecutive season

VIRGINIA TECH: Rachel Pocratsky, Junior, Track and Field

- Earned first-team All-America honors during both the indoor and outdoor seasons – the firsts of her career
- Came in fifth in the 800 at the NCAA Division I Indoor Track and Field Championships to earn her first All-America honor
- Came in fifth in the 1,500 at the NCAA Division I Outdoor Track and Field Championships to collect the second A-A honor
- Won nine times in her respective events during both the indoor and outdoor seasons and added three more wins while participating on relay teams
- Won four gold medals at two ACC Championships – two at the indoor meet and two at the outdoor meet
- Set a personal best in winning the 800 at the ACC indoor meet, running the event in a time of 2:03.17. Added a second gold medal when she participated as a member of the women's distance medley relay team that was victorious

WAKE FOREST: Jennifer Kupcho, Junior, Golf

Kupcho, a junior, became the first Wake Forest women's golfer to win the NCAA women's golf individual championship. She claimed the title with a dramatic 4-under back-nine to post a two-shot victory at Karsten Creek Golf Course in Stillwater, Okla. Kupcho shot a final round 71 to finish the tournament at 8-under and become the fourth Demon Deacon golfer to win the NCAA title, the first for the women's program. In the first round, Kupcho tied the Karsten Creek course record with a 7-under 65, capped by a 30-foot eagle putt on the last hole.

Kupcho capped the best season in Wake Forest history with her victory at the NCAA Championship. Her junior season featured four victories and two other top-5 finishes as she finished under par in a school-record eight events. Her scoring average of 70.60 set a school record, breaking the previous mark of 70.61 that she set during her sophomore season. Kupcho tied her own school 54-hole scoring record with a 15-under performance to win the NCAA Tallahassee Regional, which included a school-record 8-under 64 in the second round.

Kupcho, who earned first-team WGCA All-America honors for the second straight year, was named the 2018 Honda Sport Award winner for golf by the Collegiate Women Sports Awards (CWSA).
