

BOSTON COLLEGE: Jerome Robinson, Junior, Basketball

- Near unanimous selection as First Team All-ACC, garnering 273 of a possible 280 points
- Became the sixth player in Boston College history to be named to the ACC's First Team
- Led the ACC with 18 games of 20 points or more in the regular season - including 13 during conference play
- Finished second in voting for ACC Player of the Year honors
- Finished the regular season as the ACC's leading scorer overall (20.7 points per game) and in conference games-only (24.3 points per game)
- Also finished the regular season as the ACC leader in 3-point field goal percentage (43.8%)
- Became the fifth player in Boston College history - and first since 2007 - to be named to the Associated Press All-American team
- Was one of five national finalists for the Jerry West Award - presented annually to the nation's top shooting guard
- Also earned postseason accolades from the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association First Team; USBWA All-District I; NABC All-District II First Team
- Put forth one of the most dominant offensive performances in ACC history, scoring 46 points at Notre Dame on Feb. 6
- For his efforts, he earned CBS Sports/Quicken Loans National Player of the Week honors on Feb. 6 and was named ACC Player of the Week on Feb. 12
- The 46 points tied for the second-most by a BC player in program history
- Additionally, the 46 points were the most by a visiting player in a conference game in ACC history, dating back to 1953-54
- It also tied as the fourth-best single-game scoring total in a conference game
- The 46 points scored was the 17th-best overall in all games in ACC history
- Became the 42nd member of Boston College's 1,000 point club on Dec. 2, achieving the statistical milestone in 64 game
- Ended his career at the Heights with 1,591 career points in 90 games played - good for a 17.7 points per game average. That ranks as the 10th-best scoring average in BC history
- Scored 725 points during the 2017-18 season - the second-most points in a single-season in BC history
- Led the Eagles in scoring 20 times

CLEMSON: Seth Beer, Junior, Baseball

- Junior Seth Beer had 18 homers in 2016, 16 home runs in 2017 and had 22 homers in 2018, meaning he had 56 career homers.
- His 56 career homers were fourth in Tiger history. He led all 2018 players in the nation in career home runs.
- He was named one of 32 semifinalists for the Dick Howser Trophy, the award he won as a freshman in 2016.
- He hit .301 with 22 homers, 11 doubles, 54 RBIs, 64 runs, a .456 on-base percentage and a steal in 63 games in 2018.
- He reached base via a hit, walk or hit-by-pitch in 58 of the 63 games in 2018.
- He reached base via hit, walk or hit-by-pitch in 23 straight games from March to April.
- He hit one homer in each game of the Georgia Tech series, then did the same in the Boston College series and Pittsburgh series.
- In March, he hit a home run in four straight games, the first Tiger to do that since Kris Harvey in 2005, then did it twice in May.

- He was named national player-of-the-week by Perfect Game and ACC Player-of-the-Week on April 2, as he had four homers and 12 RBIs.
- He was named national player-of-the-month (March) by NCBWA after hitting .294 with eight homers, a double, 20 RBIs and 19 runs in 20 games.
- He was named ACC Player-of-the-Week on May 21. He was 9-for-12 with three homers, eight RBIs and an .850 on-base percentage in four games.
- In his career, he hit .321 with 41 doubles, a triple, 56 homers, 177 RBIs, 172 runs and a .489 on-base percentage in 188 games.
- He became the first Tiger in history with 16 or more homers in three seasons.
- He became the first Tiger since Matthew LeCroy (1995-97) to lead the team in home runs three times.
- He became the first Tiger since Jim McCollom (1983-85) to lead the team in slugging percentage three times.
- He had 180 career walks, tied for second in Tiger history, versus 98 strikeouts. His one walk every 3.59 at-bats was first in Tiger history.
- He reached base via a hit, walk or hit-by-pitch in 178 of his 187 career games with a plate appearance.
- He reached via a hit, walk or hit-by-pitch in 114 of his 118 career games with a plate appearance against ACC (95) and SEC (19) teams.
- He started every Clemson game from April 1, 2016 to the end of the 2018 season, a streak of 165 games.
- First-round draft pick of the Houston Astros in June 2018.
- Won the Dick Howser Trophy as national player-of-the-year in 2016, becoming the first freshman to win the award.

DUKE: Justin Guterding, Senior, Lacrosse

Tewaaraton Award Finalist ... First Team All-American ... ACC Offensive Player of the Year ... All-ACC ... USILA Scholar All-America ... NCAA All-Tournament Team ... Led the ACC in goals, assists and points for the third straight season ... Rewrote both the Duke and NCAA record books while leading the Blue Devils to the NCAA title game where they fell to champion Yale ... Became the NCAA all-time leader in career goals with 212 ... Only the second player in NCAA history to record 200 career goals ... Led the nation with 66 goals (3.30 per game) and finished second in points with 113 (5.65 per game) ... His 113 points broke the Duke single-season record of 104 held by Jordan Wolf and ranks tied for eighth in NCAA single-season history ... The 66 goals are third in Duke history and tied for ninth in NCAA single-season history ... Handed out a career-best 47 assists to rank fifth in Duke single-season history ... One of five players in NCAA history to amass over 350 career points ... Finished his career with 351 points to rank second at Duke and fifth in NCAA history ... Recorded at least one point in all 75 career games ... Was named the ACC Offensive Player of the Week six times in 2018 ... Had a hat trick in 13 of the 20 games and had multiple points in all 20 ... Posted at least five points in 12 outings in 2018 ... Scored 10 points in the season-opening win over Air Force ... Tallied three goals and three assists for six points in the NCAA semifinal win over Maryland ... Registered 21 points overall in his four ACC outings ... Overall for his career, ranks first at Duke in career goals, second in points and third in assists.

FLORIDA STATE: Andre Ewers, Junior, Track & Field

Capped his first year with the program by earning three first-team All-American honors at NCAA Outdoor Championships ... was selected ACC Men's Outdoor Track Performer of the Year in a vote of conference coaches ... scored 15 of the Seminoles 25 points as the FSU men finished 11th ... Ewers'

individual point total was the second-highest for any male in the meet ... competed in three events - 4x100, 100 and 200 - on both Wednesday and Friday, with no more than one hour between each event ... the No. 1 qualifier in the 100 on Wednesday (10.00) he finished third in Friday's final (10.19) ... qualified fourth fastest for the 200 final and came home as the runner-up (20.29) by .01 seconds ... began meet by anchoring FSU's 4x100 to a season-best time of 39.00; eighth fastest in program history ... led team to fifth-place finish in final (39.37) ... was the sprint star of the NCAA East Preliminary when he ran 9.98 in the 100; the No. 2 time collegiately and No. 3 in the world at the time ... ran 20.32 to advance as the No. 3 seed in the 200 ... took over anchor duties on 4x100 for the first time and qualified team for NCAA Championships in a season best 39.12 ... led Florida State to ACC Outdoor team title winning both the 100 (10.13) and 200 (19.98) while aiding runner-up 4x100 ... was named Men's Championship Track MVP ... finished eighth in the 200 at the NCAA Indoor Championships (20.88); overcoming false start in the 60 meter prelims ... was the No. 1 seed in the nation in the 60 with his FSU record 6.52 coming at the Larry Wieczorek Invitational ... helped the Noles to the ACC Indoor title winning the 200 (20.60) after silver medal finish in the 60 (6.64) ... a January enrollee at FSU after transferring from Butler County (Kan.) College has earned four first-team and one second-team All-American honor ... guided Noles to ACC indoor and outdoor team titles ... owns one FSU record and ranks among top eight in four other events.

Highest MLB Draft pick in Georgia Tech history when he was the No. 2 overall pick in the 2018 MLB First-Year Draft by the San Francisco Giants...Tied for the highest draft pick in Georgia Tech athletics history across all sports... 2018 first-team all-America selection by both Baseball America and Collegiate Baseball...2018 Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) Player of the Year, ACC Defensive Player of the Year and first-team all-ACC selection...Ranked No. 1 catcher in Division I by Baseball America and No. 2 by D1Baseball.com...Led the conference in hitting with a .359 average in 2018...Led Georgia Tech and

ranked second in the league in slugging percentage (.632) and hits (79), while also posting a team-high 16 home runs, 55 runs scored and .471 on-base percentage, which all ranked in the top 10 in the ACC...Had a team-high 16-game hitting streak and totaled 24 multi-hit games as a junior, included a pair of multi-home run games at Mercer on April 10 and at Virginia on May 14...Over his three years on The Flats, Bart has played in 144 games with 143 starts...Hit .321 for his career with a total of 181 base hits, 30 home runs and 35 doubles...Driven in 112 runs and scored 115, while posting a .544 slugging percentage and .407 on-base percentage...2018 team captain.

LOUISVILLE: Lamar Jackson, Junior, Football

Named a Heisman Trophy finalist for the second-straight season ... started all 13 games ... finished with a school record 1,601 rushing yards, while running for 18 touchdowns ... passed for 3,660 yards and 27 scores totaled a school best 5,261 yards of total offense ... voted the 2017 ACC Player of the Year and ACC Offensive Player of the Year, a first in the ACC's 65-year history to earn the award in consecutive seasons ... named an all-ACC first team member for the second-straight year ... registered 329 yards of total offense in the TaxSlayer Bowl against Mississippi State, accounting for three touchdowns (two passing, one rushing); rushed for 158 yards, breaking the TaxSlayer Bowl record for rushing yards by a quarterback, previously held by West Virginia's Pat White in 2007 ... surpassed Nevada's Colin Kaepernick (2007-10, 4,112 yards) for sixth on the FBS career list for career rushing yards by a quarterback ... With first rushing touchdown in TaxSlayer Bowl, became the third player in FBS history to record 50 rushing and 50 passing career touchdowns (Florida's Tim Tebow, Nevada's Colin Kaepernick) ... became the only non-senior to reach that mark ... became only player in FBS history to rush for at least 1,500 yards and pass for at least 3,500 yards in a season (did it in consecutive years) ... accumulated 372 yards of total offense against Kentucky, earning the Howard Schnellenberger Most Valuable Player for the second time ... rushed for 156 yards against the Wildcats and became the first player in Louisville history to have two seasons with at least 1,300 rushing yards ... broke two of his own school records with performance against Kentucky: logged his 12th game in a single season with 300 yards of total offense; and, achieved his ninth 100-yard rushing game of the season ... finished the game versus Syracuse with 381 yards of total offense, becoming the school's career leader in total offense ... rushed for 120 yards against the Orange, becoming only the second player in ACC history to string together five-straight 100-yard rushing games twice in his career, joining Boston College's Montel Harris ... achieved the fourth season in Louisville history with 4,000 yards of total offense by an individual (Chris Redman, 1998; Teddy Bridgewater, 2013; Lamar Jackson, 2016) ... registered fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season, going 161 yards against Wake Forest; became the fourth player - first underclassman - in FBS history with 3,000 rushing and 8,000 passing yards in a career ... became the third player - first underclassman - to have consecutive seasons with 1,000 rushing and 2,500 passing yards ... became the fifth quarterback in FBS history to rush for 40 TDs and pass for 60 TDs; doing so earlier in his career than any other player, after throwing for one score against the Demon Deacons ... had 491 yards of total offense, totaling 14th career game with at least 400 yards of offense to break the ACC record ... with 180 rushing yards against the Boston College, broke the school's career rushing yards record originally held by Walter Peacock (3,204, 1972-75) ... rushed for three touchdowns against Boston College, setting the school's career rushing touchdowns record ... became the first player in the ACC's 65-year history to have three games with at least 500 yards of total offense ... had 427 yards of total offense against NC State, becoming the third player in Louisville history, seventh in ACC history, to reach 10,000 yards of total offense for his career; he is the first Louisville player, second in the ACC, to reach the plateau before their senior season ... became the sixth player in FBS history to rush for 3,000 yards and pass for over 7,000 passing yards in a career ... the second rushing touchdown against the Wolfpack made him the ACC career record holder for rushing touchdowns by a quarterback ... rushed seven times for 100 yards and one touchdown, while throwing for 249 yards and three touchdowns

against Murray State; broke Chris Redman's school record for points responsible ... threw for two scores against Kent State and ran for one, breaking Chris Redman's school record for touchdown responsibility ... ran for 64 yards against Clemson, taking the No. 1 position in the ACC record book for career rushing yards by a quarterback; passed Georgia Tech's Joshua Nesbitt, who previously held the mark with 2,806 yards ... tossed first interception of the season against Clemson, breaking a streak of 135-passing attempts without a pick ... totaled 525 yards of total offense against North Carolina, eighth most in an ACC game in school history; became second player in FBS history to record at least 300 passing yards and 100 rushing yards in consecutive games ... surpassed 1,000 yards of total offense with his performance against North Carolina; achieved the feat in consecutive seasons and is one of only two players in FBS history since 2000 to reach the 1,000-yard plateau ... was responsible for six touchdowns against North Carolina, the fourth game in his career achieving the feat.

NC STATE: Bradley Chubb, Senior, Football

- The No. 5 pick in the 2018 NFL Draft, he was selected by the Denver Broncos.

Started all 12 games at left tackle in 2017 for the Panthers...seamlessly moved to the left side after playing right tackle in 2016...extended his streak of consecutive starts to 37 contests...selected All-ACC by the league’s coaches (first team), Associated Press (first team) and Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association (ACSMA) (third team)...against NC State, took a throwback lateral 10 yards to the cusp of the goal line...one play later, tailback Darrin Hall plunged in from a yard out to make it 14-14...also limited Wolfpack consensus All-America defensive end and top NFL Draft prospect Bradley Chubb to just two tackles, no TFLs and no sacks in that Oct. 14 game...the athletic O’Neill finished his Pitt career with three career rushes for 39 yards (13.0 avg.) and two touchdowns...named to the All-ACC Academic Football Team...selected to play in the 2018 Senior Bowl...ran the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.82 seconds) by an offensive lineman at the 2018 NFL Scouting Combine in Indianapolis...also posted the fastest 3-cone drill time (7.14 seconds) at the Combine...was selected in the second round (62nd overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings, making O’Neill Pitt’s highest-drafted offensive lineman in a decade.

VIRGINIA TECH: Jared Haught, Redshirt Senior, Wrestling

- The first native of West Virginia to reach a national final in wrestling.
- Earned the top seed at the ACC Championships on his way to winning his second consecutive conference title.
- Became only the third Virginia Tech wrestler to earn a No. 1 ranking during the season, joining Devin Carter (133, 2012) and Scott Justus (184, 2002).
- Awarded All-ACC Academic honors for the fourth time in his career.
- Named 2018 VaSID Wrestler of the Year, awarded to the state of Virginia's best collegiate wrestler.
- Went 30-3 overall and 16-1 in duals for a Hokies squad that won its second straight ACC title and placed in the top 10 in the nation for the sixth consecutive season.
- Graduated in the spring of 2018 with a degree in mechanical engineering.

WAKE FOREST: Petros Chrysochos, Junior, Tennis

Chrysochos, a junior, helped lead Wake Forest to its first tennis national championship. The Demon Deacons went 6-0 during the NCAA-run, beating Ohio State 4-2 in the national championship match. Chrysochos went 44-4 during the season and ended the year on a 30-match winning streak. In addition, Chrysochos went on to win the NCAA Singles Championship with a straight set victory over Wake Forest teammate Borna Gojo. Chrysochos was named All-American, first team All-ACC and was a three-time ACC Player of the Week. He received the ITA Carolina Region Arthur Ashe, Jr. Leadership and Sportsmanship Award. Chrysochos was named the Most Outstanding Player at the ITA National Team Indoor Championship which Wake Forest won in February. In the fall, he teamed with Skander Mansouri to win the ITA National Fall Doubles Championship.
